Activities/Events in the School – Late January - February

• WINTER OLYMPICS ACTIVITIES:

- Primary classes and a few Intermediate classes, with the assistance of Gr. 7 students, held a "Mini Olympics" on Friday, February 9th in the Activity Room and the gym. Students participated in a variety of activities representing many of the sports in the Winter Olympics.
- Grade 5-7 students participated in an "Winter Olympics Amazing Race" in the gym, outside and through the Intermediate hallways on Wednesday, February 14th. Lead in Drinking Water at Carnarvon PAC meeting Feb 20, 2018

Lesley Horton MD CCFP and concerned mother

What is lead and why does it matter?

- Lead is a soft metal that was often used in plumbing until 1986
- Lead can leach into water, especially if it is standing in pipes overnight or longer
- Lead is very toxic, particularly to the brain and can cause irreversible cognitive and intellectual impairment, with decrease in IQ, and/or poor focus and concentration, behavioural problems, anxiety, irritability, fatigue, headache
- Children absorb lead 4-5 times greater than adults
- There is no safe level of exposure (WHO, American Pediatric Association, Health Canada)

Why and when was Carnarvon's water tested?

- The Ministry of Education mandated in 2016 that all schools built before 1990 have water testing for lead
- Carnarvon was tested in June 2016 and Sept 2016 -only 3 taps were tested, in contradiction to Health Canada's guidelines to test all water sources in schools (see below)

What were the results?

- June 24 2016: Lead: 0.0427 mg/L, 0.00344 mg/L, 0.00176 mg/L
- Should be < 0.010 mg/L or < 10 parts per billion
- The American Pediatric Society says <u>1</u> part per billion is acceptable
- Sept 29 2016: 1 tap retested after 5 minutes of flushing 0.00731 mg/L

Why were only 3 taps tested at Carnarvon when Health Canada says to test every drinking location in a school?

Health Canada Section 5.1.2 Sampling to assess exposure to lead from drinking water,

...The authors found high lead levels were highly variable (lead concentrations varied by a factor of 10–2000 between taps) within large buildings and system- wide. They also confirmed that concentrations of lead at a specific tap cannot predict the lead concentrations for other taps in a building and further support the need to sample every tap in schools and daycares.

No representative sampling site can be established for most schools, thereby requiring the sampling of every drinking water location to assess exposure of children in the schools. (U.S. EPA, 2006a; Health Canada, 2009b; Schock and Lytle, 2011)

Was the sampling method reliable?

- No- it was done at 10 am on a Tuesday morning- doesn't follow testing protocol as per EPA
- Environmental Protection Agency states " Outlets must be inactive for at least 6 to 8 hours before testing. (Overnight is best.)
- Take a "first draw" 250 ml** sample at each outlet. A "first draw" is the water that is the first to come out of the tap
 after the period of inactivity. https://www.epa.gov/dwreginfo/3ts-reducing-lead-drinking-water-testing

What is the normal course of action to notify parents of a harmful substance found in the school where students are exposed daily to it? Was this followed?

What's been done so far?

- Signs went up above water fountains to flush for 5 minutes in December 2017 but no explanation given to students or parents
- Most adults won't stand there for 5 minutes to flush will kids? Especially when not informed why it's important?
- What about children who can't read yet?

Is flushing the taps for 5 minutes adequate?

- It's an adequate <u>short-term</u> solution, <u>IF</u> flushing occurs very frequently Dr. Bruce Lanphear at SFU who studies the effects of lead in children, says "flushing water through pipes is a temporary solution, noting it may only be good for an hour or two, as often time lead concentrations can build up again quite quickly." (source: Vancouver Sun Set 17, 2017 article)
- Fleming, the education minister, agreed that flushing is <u>not</u> a long-term solution to reduce lead in drinking water in schools.

What are other solutions?

- New plumbing in Surrey "the district has installed 271 new drinking fountains, 2,462 new sink faucets, 236 new bubblers and 239 filters in an effort to reduce lead in drinking water."
 Abbotsford also replaced fixtures and piping for a permanent solution. VSB??
- Automated flushing system as a medium-term solution- "the district is planning to install an automated flushing system for water lines at 63 schools built before 1990."
- In Victoria, "The district responded by installing <u>in-line filters</u>, about 500 so far, and making plumbing changes that allow filters to be easily changed, at a cost of about \$200,000."
